#### **GARDENDING CLUB**



During the past week, our latest extra-curricular activity: Gardening Club, has started. Children across all year groups have taken part and started by learning about the identification of local plants, shrubs and trees. Furthermore, the group learnt about the benefits of plants on the wildlife and ourselves. The group then ventured outside to plant trees (donated by Woodland Trust) alongside some of our perimeter fencing discussing ways in which we can care for our natural environment.

Gardening club will also focus on recycling; they have started to reuse egg cartons and kitchen roll tubes to plant seeds, some children have even made watering cans out of empty plastic bottles!

In the coming weeks, there are plans to further improve the school grounds, including our playgrounds and some local community areas. During Summer term, a range of playground equipment will be painted including tyres that divide our Key Stage 1 playground. Again, a green fingered touch will be provided as they will be refilled and planted with new herbs and plants.



#### WORLD BOOK DAY



World Book Day allowed children from all classes to share their reading with a grown up. Parents and carers of younger children experienced a phonics session and many children shared their favourite stories in our new reading areas. In addition to this,

we celebrated the children's World Book Day costumes during a World Book Day parade.



#### **PE UPDATE**

Our PE sessions this half term are in full swing. Year 1 have been developing their dribbling skills and their dance moves; they have been practising a collective dance to a pirate theme. By developing their understanding of moving in time to four beats, the children have developed their autonomy by including some individual ideas.

Year 3 have been honing their fitness techniques and Year 4 have been developing their understanding of handball.



Year 6 have been utilizing the outdoor space to improve their understanding of Tag Rugby. Having learnt the rules, they have been improving their understanding of tactics by applying these into small game situations.

### **CAPA COLLEGE NEWS**

It has been another exciting and incredibly busy few months at CAPA College! We welcomed prospective students at two fully booked Open Days, hosted a week of auditions with over 800 applicants for September 2025, and were delighted to be named the Best State Sixth Form in West Yorkshire for A-Level results by the Yorkshire Evening Post.

We started 2025 with some fantastic student collaborations. Our Year 1 Dance Pathway and Year 2 Film & TV students worked together on a Dance Films project, producing two outstanding Dance films that will premiere at our Film Festival later this term. Also our Year 1 Musical Theatre and Production Pathway students joined forces for A Night at the Musicals, an electrifying showcase featuring extracts from Come From Away, Bring It On, and Mean Girls. The performances were outstanding, with Musical Theatre students shining on stage while Production Arts students brought the show to life through set, lighting, and sound design. This incredible team effort resulted in five sell-out performances in our in-house theatre.

In March, CAPA College made a huge impact at MOVE IT, the world's biggest dance event. Across the three-day event, our students delivered three outstanding Main Stage performances and three Showcase Theatre performances. Our faculty also hosted three fully booked dance classes, and we loved welcoming familiar and new faces to our exhibition stand—including alum Kaine Ruddach, this year's official Social Media host of the event. Another hugely successful weekend at one of the biggest industry events of the year!

However a true highlight of the term was in January, when CAPA College was invited to perform at the National Lottery's Big Night of Musicals at Manchester AO Arena, hosted by Jason Manford. Our 10 students delivered a breathtaking dance performance of Electricity from Billy Elliot, celebrating the show's 20th anniversary. Their talent and energy brought the house down, earning the only standing ovation of the night from an audience of 12,000 people!

Lastly, a moment to celebrate huge successes from students past and present! Current CAPA College student Fred Kettle gave an outstanding performance in a special episode of Emmerdale, which



saw Fred take on the role of 'Dylan' in the intense storyline on April's life on the streets.

Current CAPA College student Fatima Bojang also gives an outstanding performance as the role in Jade in the hugely successful Netflix series Adolescence by Stephen Graham, the show became Netflix's Number 1 series on the weekend of its release.



A huge congratulations also to two CAPA College Alumni; Tasha Ghouri who came runner up in BBC's Strictly Come Dancing and was crowned the Winner of the Strictly Tour!


