INTER-SCHOOL YEAR 6 FOOTBALL TOURNAMENT

We are thrilled to report that the Year 6 football tournament was a tremendous success. With 12 of our schools taking part and over 230 children involved, the day was a celebration of teamwork, determination and school spirit.

Although it was a bit of a squeeze fitting in all of the fixtures, every match went ahead as planned, thanks to great organisation and the enthusiasm of everyone involved. From the first kick-off, to the final whistle, the pitches were alive with energy and excitement.

In the Wakefield league, St Giles were crowned boys' champions after a strong performance throughout the group stage. St Michael's earned the runners-up spot with a determined display. In the girls' competition, St Giles continued their winning form, taking top spot, while St Botolph's came in a well-deserved second place.

The Kirklees contests were especially close. Overthorpe won the boys' league, while Lepton and Batley Parish finished joint second. A dramatic penalty shootout saw Lepton progress to the semi-finals. In the girls' league, Lepton emerged as winners with Batley Parish taking second place after some excellent performances.

The knockout stages brought even more excitement. In the boys' semi-finals, St Giles narrowly overcame Lepton after extra time and penalties in one of the most gripping games of the day. St Michael's joined them in the final after a solid victory over Kirklees table-toppers Overthorpe. On the girls' side, St Giles beat an excellent Horbury Bridge team, while Lepton overcame a resilient St Botolph's to book their place in the final.

The girls' final saw a showdown between the Wakefield and Kirklees league winners. It was a closely matched game, but St Giles held their nerve and lifted the trophy. The boys' final brought the day to a dramatic close, as St Michael's made a blistering start that St Giles couldn't quite recover from, securing a deserved win in an all-Wakefield final.

All in all, it was an outstanding day and a wonderful first for our Trust — seeing all of our Key Stage 2 schools represented in one event was truly special. We're already looking forward to next year's tournament and can't wait to see who will raise the trophy in 2025-26.

Children across Enhance Academy Trust recently took part in a vibrant and imaginative writing competition, designed to showcase their creativity and descriptive flair.


Every child was invited to write a short narrative description—just 100 words—using the images of Henri Rousseau as their inspiration.

At the start of the year, just 13% of Year 2 children were able to skip. Now, an impressive 91% can skip in a variety of ways using an individual skipping rope.




The children themselves have shared how much they enjoy these sessions, saying, "I like jogging because it helps me get fit and strong," and "when we finish active break I feel happy and strong."
